Update on OSA Legal Status

The hearing of the En Banc review filed by the plaintiffs Amit Nayak and Agni Jandhyala took place on December 10, 2010 in the circuit court of Montgomery County, Maryland. The final verdict was in favor of OSA and the case is closed. OSA attorney Ms Linda Dorney writes the following:

"I have great news. We attended and argued the en banc review today and the 3 judge panel unanimously upheld Judge Thompson's decision to grant judgment to OSA and the individual defendants. The Court will enter an Order attaching its decision in the next week or so, which we will forward. Specifically, the Court determined that there was no abuse of discretion in denying the Motion to Strike Amended Answer and that Judge Thompson properly applied the law to allow the organization to invoke the business judgment rule as a defense in this case. Additionally, the Court found that the burden of proof that was imposed on the Plaintiffs was clear and convincing evidence of wrong doing and that the 2007 lawsuit had no bearing on the lawsuit filed related to the 2009 election. Finally, the Judges commented that they did not believe that Agni actually had standing to bring the appeal as he wasn't a member during the 2009 election. Additionally, under Maryland Rule of Civil Procedure 2-551(h), the Plaintiffs are precluded seeking further review. Please let me know if you have any questions."

2011 OSA Election 2nd-Announcement

By 2011 OSA Election Committee

Dear OSA Members:

This is a gentle reminder that the OSA Election Committee is soliciting nominations for the offices of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer of Orissa Society of Americas for 2011-13. As per the constitution, the positions of President and Vice-President will be candidates on the same slate. A vote for a presidential candidate will imply a vote for his/her running mate. The position of the Secretary and Treasurer may be from independent slates.

The nominees, the nominators and seconders must be permanent members (life, patron or benefactor) of OSA at the time of nomination. In addition, the nominees must be at least 21 years or older as of June 30, 2011. The nomination must include a short introduction of the candidates in less than 300 words. Photocopy of driver's license, or passport, or birth certificate or a notarized statement to the effect that the nominee is 21 years or older as of June 30, 2011 must be attached for the nominee's age verification.

All nominations must include the contact information (address, telephone number, and email) of the nominees and the nominator. All nominations must be sent to the election committee, postmarked by February 14, 2011 at the address below with complete and correct contact information of the nominees (including other additional details) and the of nominators. Incorrect contact information may lead to the rejection of the nomination. If the candidates wish to include their position statement with the ballot they may include it with the nomination form in a separate sheet. Please note you must nominate a candidate for President and Vice President simultaneously. Nominations for secretary and treasurer may be independent.

Relevant Articles from OSA constitution ARTICLE V: OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

By 2011 OSA Election Committee

Section 1

The ultimate authority of OSA shall be vested in the membership. The members from USA and Canada shall choose the elected officers by mail ballot.

Section 3 (as amended on July 1, 2004)

The President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected for a term of two years. These four executive officials must be life members or patrons or benefactors of OSA in good standing and must be 21 years of age or over. The Vice President shall be a running mate of the President. A vote for the President shall mean a vote for his/her running mate. The Secretary and Treasurer will be separately elected, but will work as a team with the President for smooth operation of the OSA. The President shall appoint the Editor of the OSA Newsletter.

ARTICLE VI: ELECTION

Section 1

All life members and annual members of OSA have the right to vote and participate in the election.

Section 2

All elections are to be conducted by a secret ballot. The election procedures shall be described in the By-Laws.

Section 3

No two members of the Executive Committee at any time shall be from the same immediate family (e.g. Husband & wife, parents & children, siblings) of any Executive Committee member.

Section 4

In case, a current office bearer such as, President, Vice President, or Secretary-Treasurer, decides to run for re-election or for another position, he/she shall give up all his/her election related responsibilities as defined in the By-Laws.

BY-LAW III: ELECTION PROCEDURE

Section 1

A three member election committee with one as chairman shall be appointed by the Executive

Committee and will be announced to the general body for approval by majority at the annual convention preceding the election year.

Section 2

No member of the Executive Committee is eligible to be a member of the election committee.

Section 3

The Secretary of the OSA shall prepare a list of members who have paid their dues by Dec. 31 of the year, preceding the election year. This list along with the list of life members and patrons shall be submitted to the chairman of the election committee by Jan. 15 of the election year.

Section 4

Nominations for the various offices shall be invited by the election committee chairman through the OSA newsletter of September-December quarter, preceding the election year. In case of contests, the names of the candidates shall be announced in a special letter to be sent by the election committee along with the position statement of each contesting candidate.

Section 5

The Secretary of the OSA shall print and supply the ballots to the election committee. All ballots must be sequentially numbered or coded.

Section 6

The ballots shall be mailed in the fourth weekend of March of the election year. The ballot number or code must be noted against the master membership list held by the election committee. For a returned ballot to be valid, it must be postmarked by the date on or before the 4th Monday of April of the election year.

Section 7

The election committee shall open a post office box address to which the ballots shall be mailed to by the voters. The ballots shall be counted in the presence of the election committee members and the candidates or their representatives on the second Saturday of May of the election year. The results of the election shall be announced then and there with a written statement of the results sent to the President of the OSA. All the election materials must be sealed and signed by the election committee members and the candidates or their representatives, and will be preserved by the election committee chairman for a period of six months after the election.

Section 8

The President of OSA shall submit the results to the Executive Committee for approval and for a publication in a special Newsletter by May 30th of the election year.

Section 9

The election committee shall adopt prudent ways to insure the secrecy of the voting system.

Section 10

All expenses for the election shall be reimbursed by the Secretary-Treasurer of OSA upon the submission of the expense report. The committee shall caution to keep expense within the budget.

Section 11

Any charge of election irregularity or fraud shall be reported to the President and the members of the Executive Committee for resolution.




Raja-sankranti






The event was organized by Rashmi Das, Sabita Panigrahi, Swapna Patra, Sunanda

"If you can dream it, you can do it," said my beloved mentor Dr. Ken Gilleo. Of course he was referring to technology at the time. I took his advice literally and applied it to my everyday living. After all, what kind of life would we have, without hopes and dreams?


I had a dream of running a marathon but the time never seemed to be right. I had the usual excuse; too busy doing ______(you can fill in the blank). Being an unconventional (most of my friends lovingly refer to me as "crazy") individual, I decide to pursue my dream last year. Needless to say, I needed some help to make it happen. A young neighbor of mine (actually she was my daughter's friend) told me about an amazing organization called "TeamAIDAsha (TAA)". TAA is a



joint program runs by the Boston/MIT chapters of "Association for India's Development (AID)" and "Asha for Education", two non-profit groups working on projects related to educational and social development issues among the underprivileged children and families in India. It is run by an amazing group of volunteers, dedicated to helping others. They were going to make a marathon runner out of me, but there was a catch. They asked me to bring the same hopes and dreams to some deserving children and families in the poorest parts of India. What a bargain to have my dream come true by helping underprivileged people.

On a Saturday morning in April 2009, I met the TAA group and the coach (who was an accomplished marathoner himself) on the campus of MIT. I saw a group of young, energetic, fun-loving people bubbling with enthusiasm. Some of them had no clue (like me) as to what to expect while the others were experienced runners. I knew that they can help me to run a marathon, but I needed more than their help. I needed a real reason to stay with the program. There, my son Anup came to my rescue. He agreed to train and run with me. What a treat to run side by side with my son. Officially, we became a "mother-son team" to run Chicago marathon! How awesome is that? We met every Saturday for the next five months to train for the big event. The training was quite challenging as we had to drive 80 miles each way to meet our team every Saturday. Both of us kept up with it through the cold days of April to the hot days of August. By September, we were amazed at the progress we had made. We were ready to run a marathon!

On October 11, 2009, Anup and I lined up at the Chicago Marathon starting line, along with the other 40,000 runners (yes, by now we were bonafide runners) on one of the coldest days in Chicago marathon history. Needless to say, I was really worried about Anup-that's mother in me. But once the starting gun sounded, everyone was for themselves. The energy among the runners was out of this world. A few hours later I could see the big banner that said "Finish Line." "I am there. I can't believe I just ran 26.2 miles," I thought to myself. The last few yards to the finish line was truly a thrill of a life time. As I ran across the finish line, the emotion and sense of accomplishment was over whelming. Right at the same instance the need to find Anup was also overwhelming. I didn't have a clue to his where about. As I scan the crowd worriedly looking for Anup, I saw his smiling face across the fence waiting for me. He had



finished hours before I did! The first thing he told me was "good job Mom" (he is a man of few words). Yes, we were very proud of each other. We had experienced something together that very few will ever experience. My son and I just ran Chicago Marathon. Nothing in your life can prepare you to anticipate that experience. We not only ran a marathon, but as a mother-son team, we raised more than \$11,000.00 to contribute to the hopes and dreams of an unknown child in India who can dream to govern the country one day. How cool is that?


If you thought that would be the end of the story, you would be wrong. Like many of my teammates, one marathon wouldn't be enough for me. In 2010 I not only wanted to run a marathon, but I also wanted to do something special right after crossing the finish line. I found just the right place to do it. It was Philadelphia Marathon, with the added bonus of climbing the steps of the famous Art Museum like in the movie Rocky The training started again in April (this time without Anup) leading up to the final day in November 21, 2010. I can honestly say, training wasn't always easy with work, family, travel etc. but thinking about those poor children and families in India always kept me going. I had not only a commitment to those children but to my sponsors as well. The generosity of my sponsors was no less the second time around. I was ready for my big day again. I ran the



marathon among 22,000 runners on a picture perfect day in Philadelphia. Crossing the finish line was no less an experience the second time around. The only thing that was missing from the thrill was my son and running partner Anup. Don't be surprised if you saw the mother-son team in a marathon race near you.

their annual talent display. It was a fun filled event for all ages starting from kids ages 2 and up. Big thanks to all organizers, parents and also to our Kids for keeping our




culture intact so far away in Washington DC. The cultural program was filled with various classical dances of India like Odissi and Kathak. There were musical pieces and Bollywood remixes.

A review of the Regional Drama Performances

Detroit: Gosein Mahatma



Hindu devotees who have visited some of the most popular temples in India might have had numerous experiences of greedy temple priests, or *Pandas*, demanding more money. They are never satisfied with the normal token amount. Some priests are always on the look out to cheat innocent devotees. And fights between pandas over sharing money are very common. Being a Brahmin myself and in defense of the breed let me narrate a story about the greed of the Hindu priests. It is believed that they are greedy due to a curse of Devi Sita.

"The story/legend has it that Lord Ram, his brothers and Devi Sita came to the banks of the Phalguni River in Gaya to perform the sacred rites of his father, King Dasarath.

While the brothers were bathing in the river, Sita, sitting on the banks, was playing with the sand. Suddenly King Dasarath's hungry spirit appeared and demanded food from Sita. Sita asked him to wait till his sons return so that he could be fed with the traditional *pinda* (rice roll). When Dasarath refused to wait and demanded *pinda* made of sand with which she was playing; reluctantly Sita rolled some wet mud and fed her father -in-law.

There were five witnesses to this act – an Akshaya tree, the river Phalguni, a cow, a tulsi plant and a

Brahmin. Soon Ram returned and after the *pujas* served rice for his father's spirit only to find that it did not appear as it had already been satisfied with Sita's sand rolled *pindas*. Sita told Ram the reason of Dasarath's non-appearance. Unconvinced, Lord Ram demanded a witness.

Among the five who had seen Dasarath appear and take the *pinda* only the Akshaya tree bore witness and the others lied trying to take Ram's side. Enraged, Sita cursed the other four: the Phalguni river henceforth would have no water at Gaya; the Cow would no longer be worshipped from the front; there would be no more



longer be worshipped from the front; there would be no more *Tulsi* plants at Gaya and the Gaya *Brahmins* would never be satisfied, they would always be hungry and crave for more. She then blessed the *Akshaya* tree saying that all who come to Gaya would perform the *Pinda Dana* at the *Akshaya* tree too".

Now back to the review – Detroit did a great show! The story narration is excellent and truly captured the greed/compulsions of the priests in a Hindu temple - Swapnalata Mishra did a wonderful job in writing and directing the play. However, in my opinion, the younger priest was more ebullient than required and did a little over acting. The elder priest was excellent and truly represents the yester year *goseins*. Swapnalata's intonation and actions were brilliant and she looked like a consummate artist from the movie world. The poor farmer was a bit of a letdown and could have been handled differently; but the inadequacy was compensated by an effective and none too flashy performance by Akshyay Ray as the pathetic son of a dead father.

Milwaukee: Ucheet Charcha

Milwaukee's drama Ucheet Charcha, written and directed by Raj Kishore Pati is about an out-dated



politician from Orissa who is on a visit to the US to attend OSA convention. The story line is good but a little clichéd. Raj Kishore babu could have kept the news of the minister's firing as the last breaking news instead of the same popping out in the middle. The dismissal news made the afterward story redundant as there seemed no reason for the organizers to continue with their conversation going when the guest himself ceased to be a VIP. Action wise, Raj Kishore babu looked and breathed like a minister/politician. Shreyash Patnaik was excellent as the attendant receiving the minister and the audience on the stage, comprising Sikha Patnaik and

others were good even though the questions they asked required more novelty. But kudos to the team as

those are the total number of Oriya residents in Milwaukee and everybody had to perform to make a drama look like a drama. They had to hire people from the audience, literally, to fill the stage as question asking characters.

Both the plays depict two important facets of life we live in - politics and religion - in a comical but effective way. We are not happy with either yet succumb to both.



Our memorable journey to Trinidad

The WAVES eighth international conference on Vedic Knowledge for Civilizational Harmony brought us to Trinidad and Tobago. The conference was held from 3rd to 7th August, 10. It gave us a unique opportunity to experience cultural diversity in a pluralistic society of Trinidad. Indians arrived in Trinidad as indentured laborers in 1840s and this system continued until early 20th century. They were mostly from Eastern UP and Bihar but there were also some who came from Madras as well as from Punjab and North West provinces which are now in Pakistan.

This conference also brought us face to face with a galaxy of international scholars representing Anthropology, Astronomy, Biological Sciences, Chemistry, Ecological and environmental sciences, Economics, Indology,





Physics and medical sciences, among other disciplines from different parts of the world. It was wonderful to see how these scholars were trying to interpret their disciplinary insights about human wellbeing from the perspective provided by the Vedas and other Hindu scriptures. One of the distinctive features of this conference was its unique organizational structure devoted to three tracks: firstly, scholarly knowledge production; secondly, its value and implication for daily practice and organizing political activism; and thirdly, the relevance of Vedic knowledge and practices for the modern youth.

We were impressed by the quality of papers presented by scholars from various parts of the world. They really took it upon themselves to integrate their ideas about civilizational harmony and peace in a very thoughtful and reflective way. The keynote speeches delivered by various international scholars provoked a lively discussion among all the participants. One of the highlights of this conference was the welcoming speeches and



enthusiastic participation of the Indian High Commissioner to Trinidad and Tobago, His Excellency Malay Mishra. His participation in various sessions of the conference was widely appreciated. The presence of ambassador Bhandari provided another voice representing the government of India's takes on various roles of Indian diaspora in retaining Indian culture and promoting Indian traditions.


It was first time in the history of the WAVES that its biennial conference was held outside the United States. We observed

first hand that there could not have been a better venue to organize this conference than in Trinidad and

Tobago, which is known for its vibrant multiethnic society. In the population of Trinidad and Tobago, there are about forty two percent people of Indian origin, forty percent of African origin and the rest representing other parts of the world such as Europe, Asia and the Middle East. Another highlight of the conference was the representation of a multitude of Hindu organizations such as Saraswati Mandiram, Sanatan Dharma Mahasabha, and National Council of Indian Culture (NCIC), among others. 

One of the lessons we learned from the speeches of the local luminaries was the dynamism of the Trinidad experience in multiculturalism. It has been based on the cooperation between

Hindus and Muslims in the performance of their feasts and festivals. Hindus and Muslims have lived side by side,

their places of worship have existed in the same vicinity and they have freely participated in each other's religious celebrations and cultural performances. This has been a key feature of communal harmony in Trinidad.



The conference introduced us to several local luminaries who participated in various activities sponsored by WAVES. We were so touched by the warm hospitality provided by the Hindu community. The temples run by Santana Dharma Mahasabha and served by young and old members of Saraswati Mandiram and other Hindu organizations prepared all the meals served to the delegates.

After the conference ended on the 7th of August, we extended our stay by three days and visited with several prominent members of the community. We enjoyed the hospitality of NCIC headed by Mr. Sharma who was honored by the President of India two years ago for promoting the interests of Overseas Indians. In our interviews and informal discussions with Dr. Ramdath Ramkissoon, Chairman, Saraswati Mandiram; Pundit Parasram; former Prime Minister, Basdeo Panday; Dr.

Visham Bhimull; Kenrick Seegobin, among others, we learned how they are finding meaning in their lives. Dr. Ramkisoon who is in his eighties, after retiring from his medical practice, is teaching Latin, Sanskrit and Hindi to the community members regularly. He had learned these languages early in his life he is giving back that knowledge to the members of his community. Similarly, Pundit Parasram, after retiring as Chief Medical Officer at age sixty, has begun a new journey in life. Following his father and grandfather, he has become a priest, singer and promoter of Vedic knowledge in daily life. He also runs a school to teach Hindi and Sanskrit to the younger

members of his extended family and other members of the community. Mr. Panday, with forty-five years of involvement in the local and National politics of Trinidad, has started to look at his rich life from an insider's perspective. After making history by becoming the first Prime Minister of Indian origin, he has started to write his own history. Visham Bhimull, the young doctor, gets as much pride and pleasure from his medical practice as he does from his involvement in various cultural activities of the community. He has started a Batchit club to promote conversation in Bhojpuri, and is busy



searching the roots and the meanings of the Bhojpuri and Hindi words he learned from his Nana and Nani (maternal grand parents) who played an important role in bringing him up since both his parents were working full time. Visham says, "like the mango tree, I am from India but my roots are in the soil of Trinidad." Being a third generation Indian, he takes equal pride in being an Indian as well as a Trinidadian. Ken, our tour guide, after leading a busy life of a banker and businessman has become a certified tour guide at the age sixty-two. He has now started to share the pride he feels in his culture and heritage and freely shares it with visitors to his land. These lives, metaphors of their culture, exemplify the exhortation of High Commissioner Mishra who said that knowledge should have relevance to the needs of contemporary society.

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Spotlight on Odisa

Dhauli Mahostav 2010: An unforgettable journey in Bhubaneswar, Orissa

I was wondering, when did I watch a full-fledged Chhau dance from my beloved state of Orissa? The theme was Abhimanyu Chakrabyuha. The occasion was dhauli mahotsav that started on the evening of 12th Dec 2010. In the background, the majestic Dhauli Shanti stupa and the magnificent temple next to it, fully lighted, were dazzling. A crescent moon was hanging in the sky as the canopy over the stage. What a sight! The intoxicating drum beating along with flute, sahanai and other musical instruments kept the five thousand or more audience spellbound. The environment was truly festive. Watching Chhau dance, the pride of Mayurbhanj district, Goti pua, Orissi in its pure form, under the open sky with the great Shanti stupa watching over it, is the highlight of my trip to my home. Mo Akhi pabitra hei gala.

Dhauli Mahotsav started in the year 2003 at Shanti Vihar, foothills of Dhauli, by the founder director of Orissa Dance Academy (ODA), Late Sj. Guru Gangadhar Pradhan. I can see why Guru Ganagadhar Pradhan must have envisioned such a Mahotsav. The main objective behind it is to keep the Oriya culture and its splendid heritage expressed through diverse dance and music traditions in different parts of the state alive, and reach out to the people in this post industrial high tech world. The effort is to make Oriyas aware of their rich, vibrant culture and tradition, to popularize the slowly dying expressive cultures all over the state, recognize the great minds behind it and make we Oriyas proud of our identity. The name "Mahostsav" is truly fitting for the occasion. It reminded me of my childhood growing up in Cuttack. During Ram Navami time, our sahi (neighborhood) used to organize weeklong jatra. It would start after dinner and will continue till the morning. The theme would be Ramayana in its many splendors. I remember the jatra was the highlight of my summer vacation those days. After watching live Ramayana on the stage, my friends and I will come home, have a hearty pakhala meal and sleep till midday. Of course the occasion, the whole ambiance in Dahauli theme and Mahotsav is different. But it makes me so nostalgic!

From the Bhubaneswar airport, I went straight to the Mahostav and missed the beginning. The program started with a felicitation of Sj. Banamali Moharana, the great exponent of Orissi Mardala and the founder of Mardala Academy in Bhubaneswar, who has kept the interest and art of Mardala alive in the state as well as national and international dance circle. As we all know, Orissi dance would not be performed without being accompanied by Mardala instrument.

Guru Ramahari Das, the great Orissi singer, professor in the dept of Orissi Vocal music at Utkal University, enchanted the audience with the theme song for the Mahostav. He is truly a legendry singer and promoter of Orissi songs and music. I will never forget the occasion of listening to him in 1999 when he had accompanied Kabita Diwedi, the Orissi dancer on the stage in Delhi. I do not remember the dance but I vividly remember the thralling voice of Guru Ramahari Das.

Ms. Aditi Mangaldas and group, the Drishtikon dance foundation from New Delhi presented a beautiful rendition of Kathak dance. It was followed by a spell bound performance of Orissa Dance Academy (ODA), founded by Sri Guru Gangadhar Pradhan in 1975. Now Aruna Mohanty, one of the familiar and truly amazing Orissi dancers and choreographers of the country, leads this organization. The item, Krupanidhana is a tribute to the late Akashay Mohanty, the great singer of the state and a legend in the field of Oriya music and literature. Two of his songs, "Nilachala Rasika Mani" and "Adha gadha Diayankara" with soul searching music were played out so beautifully by more than twenty artists mostly dominated by male dancers. The theme, utmost devotion to Lord Jagannath, was reflected in playing out all the festivals surrounding Lord Jagannath, the icon of Oriya identity. Watching the festivals relating to my beloved Jagannath, such as Chandana (sandalwood paste festival), Jhulana (swing festival) and ratha Jatra (car festival), I was transported to another realm. The music, dance and the accompanying orchestra simply are indescribable in words. One has to watch it to experience the feeling and emotion for Lord Jagannath. I became each character like the devadasi, the maluni (garland maker), the carriers of the Ratha (chariot) among others in identifying with my soul Prbhu Jagannath. I feel so blessed to be part of this occasion!

Next item was chhau dance from Mayurbhanj. It started with a solo performance of Nataraj, Lord Shiva, the cosmic dancer who is known as the destroyer of the universe in order to recreate it. He is said to be the originator of all dance forms. This performance by the Chhau dancer, Uttar Sahi, truly played out all the emotions and sentiments of the cosmic dancer who carries the burden of the Universe. It was followed by an amazing dance drama, the chakrabyuha created by Guru Dronacharya, depicting a scene from Mahabharata. The most difficult scene is when Abhimanyu, the young son of Arjuna, gets in to the chakrabyuha and fights with all the elders, Drona, Bhisma and the Kaurava brothers (his grandparents and uncles) fearlessly; but he does not know how to get out of it. Ultimately he gets killed in the hands of his own elders. One asks the eternal question, what is right and what is wrong? Who decides it and how is it justified? The dance drama was flawless. The vigor, style, emotions and the music were just out of the world! I had never watched a chhau style dance drama. It is a rare treat.

The evening ended with awards, recognitions and accolade. Aruna Mohanty (the president of Orissa dance Academy) has organized the whole show so beautifully! My sincere thanks and appreciation goes to her for not only organizing such a mega program but most selflessly committed to promoting the dance cultures of Orissa in the state and also all over the country. Jai Jagannath!

Bimal Krushna Mahanti

After his undergraduate degree in Mechanical Engineering from IIT, Kharagpur, he came to Cornell University and received MS degree in Industrial Engineering in 1959. He was warm, hospitable and a great conversationalist on many topics. My impression of him sustained our relationship for all future years. Bimu Bhai moved to the States in 1968 as an employee of IBM. After I moved to India from 1996-98, I moved back to Canada in 1968. We used to visit each other frequently. Just soon after his arrival was the formation of OSA. He joined OSA founders like K. M. Das, Amiya Patnaik, Duryodhan Mangaraj, Birendra Patnaik, Kalpataru Kanungo and others in those formative years of OSA.

Before moving to Germany, he taught at Burla Engineering College and IIT, Bombay. But he excelled in IBM moving to high ranking posts during his career at IBM USA (1968-78, 1984 -91) and IBM Belgium/France (1978-83).

Although he acquired many American and European friends and always lived in style with high taste, Bimal Mahanti was a typical Odia in his heart and moved in Odia circle at every opportunity he would get. In OSA 1984 Souvenir, K.M.Das wrote on him: Mr. Bimal K. Mohanty of IBM fame has been the founding president of the Jagannath Society of New York and helped the first Odissi dance program by Dr. Minati Mishra in New York.

Bimal Mahanti had a bright academic career, was fluent in Odia, English, German and Hindi and an avid reader of literature, philosophy, history, science, engineering, geography and other topics. While he was full of appreciation of brilliant minds and admired the company of intellectuals, he was equally comfortable in any social circle being a master joke and story teller. Despite his short stature (5'3"), he stood tall in any conversation gathering and dominated the scene. He had the ability to converse in any subject whether it is a serious topic or a mundane matter. He had a flare to explore new avenues. Once he decided to memorize Bhagabat Gita and he did it. He could quote lines with explanation in reference to an appropriate topic. If he was in a great mood he would entertain his guests with his culinary arts.

Bimal Mahanti is survived by his wife Sanjukta and two sons Jay and Jeet.

We will miss him. May his soul leave in peace.

Guru Gangadhar Pradhan - the dancer-organizer (1948 – 2010)

"Tomorrow, when this old bloke is dead and gone, there will be thousands of Gangadhar Pradhans to replicate his dreams of preserving and propagating the Orissan art across the seven seas. And this blessed soul will shed tears of joy from above, remaining indebted to Lord Jagannath for daring him to dream." - Gangadhar on himself

In seeking to discover my own roots, I have often asked myself what qualities most Oriya people would share. My study of Orissan literature, history and legends persuades me that the Oriya at home is basically a farmer who is deeply interested in art. Farming and artistic commitments are found in many cultures, in Orissa, favored by prosperity, the art became lyrical. Gangadhar Pradhan was an icon of this Oriya identity, embodied its robustness in his every gesture.

I met Ganga (Gangasir to many) in 1984, while he was accompanying the late dancer Padmasri Sanjukta Panigrahi. I had not even heard of him before, and his appearance without our familiar Kelusir bothered me. The event was in Sanders Theater, a premier venue for public and academic events at Harvard. Our recently formed Orissa Society of New England co-sponsored the event, along with Cutural Survival, which leads in work to preserve ethnic identity in remote places all over the earth. The 1200-seat theater was full to capacity. In the very first few moments of the recital, I realized why Ganga was there -- to synchronize with Sanjukta's magnificently fast foot work. I was a recent immigrant and had joined Harvard just a year before. The whole scene, the drummer and the dancer were mesmerizing. In the background. Sajukta's husband Raghunath started singing. The speed of the percussion was indescribable, the voice was meant only to explain the dance. No one in the audience had ever witnessed such magnificent body movementsperformed to the exact beat of percussion. Harvard was already blessed with Indrani Rehman's residence in campus and Kelusir's visit in 1976, but the Sanjukta-Ganga combination was an act to behold, hailed by thunderous applause. A new art form was entering the conservative Boston arts community!

Kelusir accompanied the dancer Sharon Lowen in her US tour in 1986, and I, with other Oriya friends, caught up with him in New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art. This was Sharon's first tour after her passionate adoption of Odissi. With her expressive eyes, she was very effective in exhibiting various gestures. In the final segment Kelusir performed to the song "Ahe nila saila." I had never before seen such toned muscles, exquisite hand movements, facial and eye expressions and masculine ecstasy on stage. I never learned how much Gotipuas exercised, I had never understood to what extent our dance is community-based -- how it is an art of the soil. Kelusir single-handedly had brought Orissa to the international stage through his pure devotion. We were grateful. We felicitated Kelusir in New York. From him I came to know of Ganga's Gotipua connection and the dance training, Privately he humbly admitted that Ganga had been his competitor in taking away the task of accompanying Sanjukta. We were trying to find students for Kelusir in Cuttack families and his words were a call from the heart!

In the summer of 1986, when OSA convention was held in Toronto, a wholly different Odissi composition was

performance and its Odissi was transformed into a ballet, a spectacular sensory experience, with multiple movements, sometimes in unison, sometimes individualized. The teacher Chitralekha (Chhotray/Patnaik) was a good friend of ours and her whole family was committed to dancing. I came to know that the spirit behind the choreography was our mardala-player Gangasir. Three years later in 1989, I met Ganga again in Boston, when he was accompanying Sharon Lowen. Though I admired their work, throughout the performance I thought about my childhood associate Kelusir. The event was organized by the local Philips Academy, a prep school. There was no other Oriya in the audience. The enthusiasm of our Society had waned through the typical rivalries that haunt us.

Gangasir became a frequent visitor to the US through the auspices of the Center for World Music, aided by the efforts of our friends Gopa and Purna Patnaik in San Diego. As a family they have dedicated themselves to the cause of Odissi and Ganga helped substantially through his visits, enthusiasm and resources. Ganga also visited Toronto, helping Chitralekha in her ventures in choreography and in training her students. Thanks to their diligent application and sensitive performance, the children in both these families have turned out to be widely acclaimed dancers. Particularly I should mention of Devraj Patnaik, the young son of Chitralekha, who has adopted Odissi as a passion and is credited with many artistic compositions performed in Canada and the US. Manoranjan Pradhan, a student of Gangadhar, has been a leading performer and resident teacher for many institutions in the US. Odissi training for young male dancers is a contribution by Gangadhar.

Staying abroad, we miss a lot of activities with which we were intimately involved back in Orissa. This includes the launching of new art institutions and the presentation of new art forms. I had heard of Konarka Natya Mandap, but until the great hurricane of 1999 I had no idea of its pre-eminence in the Orissan cultural scene. Somnath Behura of Houston was in touch with the festival and requested that we support it since its infrastructure was severely affected by the cyclone. Amidst our usual aid for relief, farming and habitation, this was the only institution whose infrastructure rehabilitation we supported. I visited Orissa in December 1999, making rounds to check the utilization of OSA funding. On this trip, I met Ganga at his dance school in a nondescript road in Bhubaneswar. In that 20 ft by 20 ft room, there were about thirty young girls lined up in a matrix, and Ganga's group teaching was in full swing. Ganga described his pride in organizing the school, his face glowing with joy and with a humble Bhaina (elder brother) in every sentence. I hugged him and told him how immensely proud I was. I had seen young children in Kala Vikash Kendra decades ago. Now I saw a creative transformation. There was mirth, enthusiasm and light. Our little dancer Sonali from Michigan was also in the line-up. Dozens of Sanjuktas were being prepared by a vigorous teacher!

I continued to follow happenings at Konarka with interest and caught up with Ganga in 2008 at Bhubaneswar. I heard of his new initiative at Dhauli. I heard of Debibabu's (Debi Prasad Misra in Huntsville, AL) support to Ganga's initiatives and was delighted to know of these developments. On Sunday the Oct 10th, I was in phone with Bhubaneswar when I learned that his life was hanging by a thread. He apparently passed away the next hour. In the media I saw his son's grief, and I once again felt how little we do for our artists and our talents. Ganga had become just another patient in a big hospital, and his physicians hardly knew what a treasure he was for the State and her people. He was not a politician, but a man of the soil, a farmer turned artist. He didn't succeed in getting special care for his art!

Like a farmer, Gangadhar thought the seeds he sowed would germinate and luxuriate. They must. He moulded many worthy teachers and dancers, who can continue to carry the torch with grace and dignity. It's our duty to keep his dream alive, not just among individuals who love his art but also in institutions which can help firmly establish Odissi in the place he envisioned. Kelusir took Odissi to the corners of the world, Gangadhar brought the world to the land where Odissi was born. His vision was to celebrate, to learn and to dance, creating vibrations of good will! He got Orissa drumming! Let him shed tears of joy from his abode with the Lord!
