# 17th. Annual Convention of OSA - 1986 July

It was a convention par excellence! It's magnitude was unprecedented in OSA's record books. There were 360 attendees from all parts of United States and Canada including many visiting parents and relatives. The campus of Erindale college provided a perfect atmosphere for the festivity over 2 days.

The opening ceremony had many distinguished guests including Mayor of Mississauga, the minister for cultural affairs from the Ontario government, the deputy high commissioner of India, the consul general of India in Toronto, members of parliament from both the federal and the provincial levels. The mayor of Mississauga officially opened the ceremony with a colorful speech. A cultural program followed with sloka path from Gita, Matru Vandana, mid-

eastern dance, scottish group dance and childrens group representing the cities and rivers of Orissa.

The young talent show continued for about two hours after the opening cultural program. It included Odissi. Bharat Natyam, Kathak, oriya folk dance, modern dance, piano recital, group song, Radhakrishna dance. Snake charmer dance, ratnakar drama, Jagannath Kirtan. Tabla demo, and many more. The evening program was quite enjoyable and included participants from all chapters of OSA. The program lasted for about six hours. Chitralekha Patnaik was the master of ceremonies for the opening program. Leena Manasinha was the emcee for the youth talent show and Pramod Patnaik (Mabama) compered the evening show. Lighting and stage coordination was masterfully done by Pramod Patnaik of Toronto.

There was a number of discussions seminars on various topics with invited guests. Pritidhara and sister Niharika Mohanty worked very hard to put these together. The following is the collection details from various cities - New Jersey (\$275), Boston (\$500), Buffalo (\$130), Washington (\$730), Chicago (\$400), Minneapolis (\$500), Huntsville (\$720), Detroit (\$1020), Dallas (\$455), New York (\$990), San Jose (\$425), Los Angeles (\$1182). Out of the total collection of \$7327, \$1235 came from non-oriya programs. Expenses were paid for 2 people, Prafulla Kar and Umesh Kar.

Purna Patnaik wants to convey special thanks to the Los Angeles group who opened their hearts and wallets when they found out that he may be running into red, that being the last program in the concert.

### Australia/New Zealand

Many thousand miles and a marathon 16-hour plane-trip later, Sydney welcomed me with its glistening bay and a mildly cool breeze on a bright June day. After a quick phone call from the hotel, I locate Dilip Mohanty. Much excitement follows. Dilip Babu claims it is rather unusual to meet Oriyas in Sydney and a meeting is planned for the evening.
